ADDISON'S MOTHER SHARES HER STORY

Just over five years ago, I was holding a perfect newborn baby girl in my arms and being told that she had failed her newborn hearing screening. I was overcome with sadness and fear for our gorgeous baby, who was born to a life with so many beautiful sounds to offer, yet she was living in her own silent world. This was going to be a new journey where life would be tough, and we would be alone... or so we thought.

As time would pass and we would find more resources and learn more about our child, the future slowly became brighter. Addison enrolled at Heuser Hearing & Language Academy at age three. We knew from the very first visit that this was home... it was where she was meant to be!

She had the privilege of attending Heuser for two years, and it became her home away from home, our extended family.

I gave the teachers a baby girl wrapped tightly in her cocoon, who was barely three. Her speaking mainly consisted of some basic signs and a very limited vocabulary. At the end of this school year, they gave me back a butterfly with the biggest most beautiful wings, ready to fly away and take on this world. They gave me a child who just last week asked us: "Can

you hear the birds singing?" They gave me a child with a passion for music, who loves to sing and couldn't be more confident in her ability to do so.

These are things I thought were merely my dreams for her... things I didn't realize would one day become her reality. It's time for her to move on to kindergarten as any other child her age would. We will embrace this change and see her through it, but Heuser Hearing & Language Academy will always be our home. It's where teachers change lives and lifelong friends are made.

MYAH'S STORY

Myah Meredith, a beautiful red-haired, blue-eyed girl, was born on February 13, 2000. As first born child of Doc and Kimberly Meredith, she brought lots of anticipated joy. Upon leaving Hardin Memorial Hospital, they were told to return in two weeks for another hearing screening. After failing the second screening, they were referred to Norton Children's Hospital for an ABR (Auditory Brainstem Response test). The intern working started crying as the results were displayed on the screen. Myah had no brain response to hearing in either ear and was profoundly deaf in both ears.

Being only a month old, Myah didn't know what challenges lay ahead. They were referred to Heuser Hearing Institute. At two months old, she was fitted with hearing aids. Being so young and growing every day, the molds that went in her ear to hold the hearing aids had to be remade each month. One day a week, Cheryl Donaldson, Director of Early Intervention and Speech

Services, would visit Myah's home for speech therapy. She worked with Myah on making sounds with her voice and also taught her to be aware of all the sounds in her world. Cheryl also taught Myah's parents how to teach Myah that sound comes from the ear and to learn to listen for it.

Early on, Heuser mentioned that Myah would be a candidate for a cochlear implant. It was evident that Myah wasn't gaining any speech sounds with hearing aids. The path was set and Myah became the first child in Kentucky to have a cochlear implant at age one. Four weeks later, the cochlear device was turned on. She cried upon the sound of just room noise. Each week, she learned to hear more sounds and make sounds with her voice. By age two, she had surpassed hearing children her age in speaking. Heuser reduced her speech therapy to once every two weeks. At age three, therapy stopped, but learning, hearing and speaking did not.

Heuser Hearing Institute definitely made an impact on Myah's life.

Myah attended LaRue County High School as the only student in the entire school system with a cochlear implant. **She made a 34 on her ACT with a perfect score of 36 on the reading section and a perfect score of 36 on the grammar section.** She graduated in May 2018 with honors and was salutatorian of her class of over two hundred students. She received the National FFA scholarship for academics and leadership. Myah received the Presidential Scholarship from Eastern Kentucky University, where she is attending as a pre-vet major and then plans to further her education at Auburn University for Vet School. Myah's mother Kim shared that, "Heuser Hearing Institute definitely made an impact on Myah's life."



Heuser Hearing Institute launched the ListenUp! Project in 2016 thanks to a generous donation from Delta Dental of Kentucky's Making Smiles Happen.

Every year, countless Kentuckians deal with the problems associated with hearing loss but are unable to afford the proper care needed to experience sound. The ListenUp! Project provides hearing aids to those in our community who are unable to afford them in exchange for volunteering at Louisville area nonprofits.
