art and dress-up, and would like it to have a doorbell. Ellie Kate's mom, Jana asked that the house incorporate sounds and lights so Ellie Kate can work on her therapy at home. In October, Kosair Charities announced that Heuser Hearing Institute will receive a \$218,000 grant to guarantee that kids like Ellie Kate and her future little sister receive the therapy and education they need to ensure a healthy and successful future. Ellie Kate started her journey at Heuser Hearing Institute in the early intervention program. Ellie Kate received occupational therapy, learning how to chew and swallow solid foods and how to crawl, cruise, walk and run, all before her second birthday. Ellie Kate received loaner hearing aids while the Cook family began the process of getting her cochlear implants. The hearing aids did not do much good for Ellie Kate, and insurance approved their request for the

weekly playgroup at Heuser. Because she had never heard sound before, she had to be taught how to listen and respond. Ellie Kate graduated from the early intervention program and enrolled at Heuser Hearing and Language Academy. Jana says, "Ninety percent of children who are deaf are born to hearing parents. The only way hearing parents know what to do is because agencies like Heuser are there to hold our hands from the beginning." New Year's Resolution: Eat Well for Healthy Hearing You've probably heard the phrase "you are what you eat." While that may not be entirely true, the foods you consume can have a positive effect on your hearing. Studies indicate foods rich in certain nutrients can help boost

Omega-3 fatty acids, typically found in fish such as salmon, tuna and sardines, contain anti-inflammatory properties that help strengthen the blood vessels in the inner ear, helping protect against hearing loss. Research shows that individuals who eat two or more servings of fish a week are 42% less likely to develop presbycusis (age-related

your hearing. In some cases, they may even help prevent or delay hearing loss.

folic acid include leafy greens such as spinach and romaine lettuce, black-eyed peas, kidney beans and black beans, and nuts. Persons over the age of 50 with a folate deficiency have a 35% higher risk of hearing loss. Vitamin B12 works similarly; like folic acid, it creates new red blood cells and improves the flow of blood to the ears. Foods high in B12 include lean meats, dairy and eggs. Clams, liver and fish are especially high in this nutrient.

Antioxidants are another excellent source of protection from hearing loss, particularly folic acid. They help reduce the number of damage-causing free radicals in your body, and ultimately help prevent hearing loss. Good sources of

oranges, grapefruit and bell peppers. Vitamin E helps improve circulation and can be found in almonds, peanut butter and sunflower oil. Vitamin D keeps the bones and tissue in the inner ear healthy, preventing bone loss and otosclerosis; good sources are fish and milk. Zinc is another nutrient that can help protect against age-related hearing loss. It can be found in dark chocolate and

Vitamin C helps boost the immune system and is plentiful in citrus fruits and vegetables. Excellent choices include

oysters, among other foods. Magnesium may prevent noise-induced hearing loss. Look for it in bananas, potatoes, artichokes and broccoli. While there's no guarantee that consuming these foods will keep you from developing hearing loss, including them
