LISTEN UP! PROJECTS GIFTS HEARING AIDS TO PAT COMPTON

Pat has been a patient at HHI for the last 8 years. A resident of New Albany, she grew up in Louisville where she worked for the U.S. Census Bureau part-time. She currently volunteers in the gift shop at Baptist East Hospital where she has done so for the last 15 years. The first time she visited Heuser Hearing Institute, she was experiencing vertigo – that was 3 years ago – and she was sold on the care and treatment she received immediately.

At the age of 78, Pat suffers from severe hearing loss. If selected for the new ListenUp Project where she would receive a new set of hearing aids, it would make a tremendous difference in her life. She heard about the project through Heuser Hearing Institute. "Since my hearing loss is so bad, I can't hear at all when there is more than one noise in the room," says Pat.

This grandmother of 5 and 2 great-grandchildren, wants to remain active and continue her volunteer time at the hospital where she enjoys meeting the many visitors who come to visit their sick loved ones and get much needed care. Pat is also an active member in her church Bible study and hearing would help her enjoy her Bible teachings and friends. She also performs with the Hikes Point Christian Church Praise Team, something that is aided by her wearing hearing aids. "I hope I can qualify for the new hearing aids because it would transform my entire life and let me go about my day doing all the things I love to do," adds Pat.

Project is creating an opportunity for people to volunteer at various locations around Louisville in exchange for free hearing aids. This community-based solution started in 2016 from the generous donation by Delta Dental Kentucky's Making Smiles Happen® Program. If you know Heuser Hearing Institute, odds are you have run into Wende Elkins. She's often the first voice you hear at Heuser when you call and is always the voice you hear when you have a question. Wende is the assistant behind the man at the helm of the organization that was founded in 1948 to address the needs of the deaf and hard of hearing community. She has been executive assistant at HHI for the last 15 years, since 2002 when she first walked through the doors at 115 E. Kentucky Street.

Wende has seen many changes during her 15 years at Heuser. A native of Memphis, Tennessee, she has happily adapted Louisville culture and is a huge University of Louisville fan as she wears red and white all the time and is a proud member of Cardinal family. She and her 14-year old daughter, Taylor, can be seen at Louisville

volleyball games, basketball games and walking up and down Frankfort Avenue enjoying shopping and restaurants. Swimming at Lakeside is our favorite weekend activity.

One of the biggest changes at the school according to Wende has been the increase of technology. "When I first came to Heuser, there were no smart boards, no computer lab or iPads," she says. "It's been nice to watch the school (HHLA) evolve as technology advances," she adds. When asked her favorite part of the job, her response is an easy one – the children. "No matter how stressful your day is -- one smile or hug from one of the children – and the day turns around," she says.

Her job can also be frustrating, she adds, and money is always a factor. "Being a non-profit, Heuser is always

in need of money," says Wende. She often wishes the burden of fundraising could be lifted off their shoulders so the organization could strictly focus on hearing healthcare. Nonetheless, Wende feels the future is bright. "I wish for Heuser to have another amazing 68 years helping all who struggle with hearing loss."



TIPS FOR HEALTHY SUMMER EARS

Whether it be playtime in the water or music in the sun, we rarely consider the safety of our ears, but summertime fun can be hazardous to our ears and hearing. Keep your ears safe this summer by keeping your ears dry and clean, protecting the skin of the ear, and avoiding music blasts.

Most of us can enjoy water activities in all types of water without any risks. But for some, a condition known as "swimmer's ear" is common. Swimmer's ear is an inflammation or infection of the outer part of the ear. It is caused from bacteria that results from polluted water being trapped in the ear canal. To help prevent swimmer's ear, dry your ears after swimming and avoid exposure to known pollutants.

Skin cancer is more likely to develop on areas of the body more often exposed to sun. The ears are areas of high risk for skin cancer. The skin over the ears is thin and is rarely shadowed from sun light during typical daily activities. Additionally, we tend to forget to use sunscreen on our ears. For the most protection from the sun, wear brimmed hats with UV coating and never forget to use sun screen.

The music of summer can be fun and memorable, but if it is too loud for even a short period of time; it can have life changing consequences. Over exposure results in permanent hearing loss. Symptoms of noise induced hearing loss include muffled sound or feeling like you can hear sound but not understand words. For safe listening with ear buds, your music should not be audible to anyone else. For concert listening, do not stand too close to speakers.

Enjoy the sun, water and sounds of summer, but don't forget your ears. For safety, use sunscreen, keep your ears dry and turn down the volume.

Summertime Tips for Healthy Ears

- Keep your ears dry. After swimming, tilt and shake your head to drain water from ears
- Avoid swimming in dirty water from a lake or stream, rinse ears with clean water
- Use a shower cap to keep ears dry while showering or dry ears with a hair dryer
- Clean ears with a clean washcloth avoid using cotton swabs, unless using to clean the outer ear. Do not dig into the ear canal with a pointed object
- If you wear hearing aids, take them out often as possible to give your ears a chance to dry out
- Use sun screen on your ears and don't forget your ear lobes
- Turn down the volume of your music
- If you use earbuds, keep them clean and make sure your music is only audible to you
