HEARING LOSS STATISTICS


705,533 PEOPLE in Kentucky experience hearing loss.

- ★ American adults with unaddressed hearing loss achieve less education and have higher unemployment rates than those with unaffected hearing.
- ★ People with unaddressed hearing loss are half as likely to achieve higher education, and those who are employed historically earn lower wages.

OUR WORK

Heuser Hearing Institute

Founded in 1948, the Heuser Hearing Institute (HHI) is the only nonprofit organization in the Greater Louisville and Southern Indiana region providing access to world-class and comprehensive hearing, speech, language, and balance disorder services. Through the powerful combination of a hearing health care clinic; a preschool and kindergarten program for children with communication disorders regardless of the ability to pay; and now KY HEARS, which offers statewide access to mobile and permanent hearing screening facilities, HHI provides a unique continuum of care for all ages—from diagnosis to treatment across the lifespan.



SHERRY MARTINEZ

Sherry Martinez's vestibular dysfunction journey began with a frightening temporary vision loss event while at work. What followed were many additional symptoms, including dizziness, difficulty with balance, visual processing issues, motion-related issues, cognitive function deficits, severe light sensitivity, multiple sensory issues, a loss of bodily awareness in space and much more.



Sherry's search for a diagnosis was difficult and included visits to multiple specialists. None of these doctors could diagnose what was causing the symptoms, and Sherry grew despondent. Finally, a neurologist referred Sherry to HHI, and her journey to recovery began. Recognizing that Sherry's issues were vestibular, HHI Clinical Director Dr. Ingrid Edwards and HHI therapist Barbara Martin helped Sherry get her life back, and she is on the road to a full recovery.

"I firmly believe without the incredible team at the Heuser Hearing Institute, I would never have been properly diagnosed and would be living in continuous pain and anguish from these disorders, without hope for recovery. This team has given me back my life!"





THE SCHOOL

Heuser Hearing & Language Academy

Heuser Hearing & Language Academy (HHLA) is a comprehensive educational community that exists to empower those with hearing loss or speech, language and communications disorders to reach their full potential and effectively participate in the community.

HHLA Highlights

- ★ HHLA received five stars (the top rating) in the Kentucky ALL STARS program.
- ★ 95% of HHLA children mastered their speech and language goals.
- ★ 90% of students at HHLA showed growth in **both** their expressive and receptive language skills.
- ★ During the school year, all students received free audiology services every day, including a daily hearing aid check, repair of broken devices, replacement of batteries and hearing testing.
- ★ HHLA offered four summer programs.
- ★ HHLA was chosen by the U.S. Department of Education to host French dignitaries interested in how we educate children with hearing loss.

HOLLEY FAMILY

Frances Rose Holley was born on May 23, 2020, and her journey with HHI began almost immediately. Frances Rose was diagnosed with a rare form of conductive hearing loss and was fitted for a bone-anchored hearing aid (BAHA) in July 2020. She proudly wears her BAHA and calls them her "ears"!

Frances Rose also has a speech and language disorder, and due to the intentionality of how the teachers and staff interact with the children by speaking, signing and singing, Frances Rose is thriving! She was in the pre-K 4 class this year and speaks in full sentences now. She is a free-spirited and assertive four-year-old girl with a kind heart and a strong sense of independence, thanks to her teachers, who all tell her she can do anything.

THE STATEWIDE **REACH**



Launched in 2022, KY HEARS is a statewide hearing health care initiative designed to increase access to hearing care, especially in rural areas throughout Kentucky. With both mobile and permanent hearing screening facilities, KY HEARS removes barriers to care, helping Kentuckians gain equal access to hearing health care that can improve student education and reduce employment gaps for those with hearing challenges.

KYNEARS

Since the launch of KY HEARS:

- ★ 5,200 patients have been tested and screened for hearing loss.
- 🛨 26 Kentucky counties have been served through workshops, fairs and hearing clinics.
- 🛨 15,000 community outreach opportunities have been undertaken, including resources, information and social media engagement.

JOSE VASQUEZ

For Jose Vazquez, living with significant hearing loss was a way of life—a challenging and isolating way of life. In rural Kentucky, where Jose lived, there were no resources to help him address his hearing loss, and he struggled to maintain employment and connect to his community. After seeing a KY HEARS flyer, Jose came to a clinic in Grant County, where his hearing was tested, and he was ultimately fitted with hearing aids.


To say that Jose's life has changed dramatically for the better since addressing his hearing loss is an understatement. Once homeless and unemployed, Jose is now working, and he and his dog, Abigail, recently moved into an apartment.

That job and apartment are located in Louisville because Jose and Abigail relocated to be closer to his hearing health care provider and the family he found at Heuser Hearing.
